Evansville, Indiana, passed away Friday, June 5, 2015 at Heritage Center.

Ross was born in Evansville, Indiana on December 30, 1931 to the late Jason and Laura (Swope) McCutchan. He graduated from Reitz High School in 1949 and served in the U.S.

Air Force during the Korean War. Ross sold veterinary supplies for 30 years until his retirement and served on the board of the Vanderburgh County 4-H Center. He was a faithful member of Blue Grass United Methodist Church for over 50 years.

Ross is survived by his daughters, Debbie Backus (Bob), and Donna Gassier; sons, Jeff McCutchan, Dana McCutchan (Tammy) and Kirk McCutchan (Diana); brother, Niel McCutchan (Judy); 11 grandchildren; and 13 great grandchildren.

NEWS LETTER


