## FROM WINTER HAVEN, FL . . .

We've had an interesting year with a couple of nice trips and a couple of conventions/reunions.

Last fall we visited Vicksburg (MS) Military Park. It is in the National Park system. Vicksburg was one of the important battles in the Civil War. The park is within the city limits of

Vicksburg and contains the battleground of the siege, monuments for the various Union and Confederate army units and memorials that various states that their government contributed to the area. It also has an 'Ironclad' riverboat the Union used in the Civil war. The park reminds me of the time when there were a lot of woods around the McCutchanville area with hilly roads and shady areas. The lines of siege for both armies are laid out both with markers and pamphlets attained at the visitor center. One of the more interesting state memorial/monuments was Illinois. It had a classic domed building that was open. On the inside walls were bronze plaques for all the soldiers from IL that participated in the Siege of Vicksburg. Our son, Allen, has become quite interested in those battles.

This year we took a 'round robin' trip encompassing FL, AL, IN, OH, TN, GA and back. Allen wanted to see Fort Morgan on the eastern part of Mobile, AL bay. We had to go through Gulf Shores, AL to get there (which was a traffic nightmare on 4 Jul weekend). The Fort was used during the Civil War, WWI and WWII eras. It was interesting as maintained by the state of AL. I was surprised we could sea oil wells drilled in Mobile Bay. The Fort had lookouts and shore gun emplacements incorporated in it.

After we left Fort Morgan we drove on to Evansville to visit our niece Marcia McCutchan and eat at Wolf's. Judy, Allen and Marcia really enjoy their ribs. I like their lemon meringue pie. We had an enjoyable evening there dodging a rain storm during that time.

Leaving there we drove up the new I-69 to Washington, IN and drove across country stopping at French Lick for a while. Since we had visited Spring Mill fairly recently we decided to go on through south IN toward Dayton. We stopped in Columbus, IN to tour the Bakalar Air Museum at their airport. I flew C-119s from there in the mid-70s before the aircraft were taken for conversion to gunships during the Vietnam era. It was an interesting museum and brought back memories of the base there. They also have information there about Camp Attabury. During this time, I flew the various aircraft in that unit from 1967 through 1977 (after it moved to Grissom AFB, IN).

We spent 4 days in Dayton at a helicopter unit reunion of mine – the Pedro Rescue Helicopter Association (HH-43). We had around 70 crewmembers that flew during the 10+ years that the helicopter was used. It was the first USAF helicopter in Southeast Asia used for rescue of air crew members. In 2012 I learned that one of my (our unit's replacement pilots) was shot down in fall of 1965, captured and imprisoned in the Hanoi Hilton for seven years. Then this year a pilot that I flew with in Thailand spoke about his participation in the effort to recover some of those POWs in North Vietnam. We also visited the USAF Museum at Wright-Patterson for a day.

During that time there in Dayton Judy met up with and visited a lady that she had been confirmed with at Concordia Lutheran Church on Stringtown. They had not seen each other for over 61 years. As you can imagine they had a LOT to talk about.

After leaving Dayton it was Allen's turn to go to places he wanted to see. We stopped at Mammoth Cave to revisit the area we hadn't visited in years. Wow, was it crowded. Allen & Judy walked down to the cave and back. Suggestion if anyone visits there this summer is to get there early and reserve a time for a tour. Because this is the Park Service's 100<sup>th</sup> all of the parks are quite busy.

After leaving the KY area we again traveled cross country avoiding the interstates and Nashville and proceeded to Chattanooga. There we went to Lookout Mt. and Allen & Judy walked through the park there.

Allen found a couple of places in Georgia to visit then the next couple of days. One in Columbus, GA was the center of the Confederate Naval Yard building area. The museum there had several recovered boats there that were interesting along with a multitude of artifacts. After leaving there we were close to Ft. Benning so we visited the US Army Infantry Museum. The entry area takes a person through the history of the army (infantry) from its start.

We finally got home after a week and a half of traveling. It was good to have Allen along to take care of some of the driving as he & I took turns driving or 'navigating.' Unfortunately for Judy she was relegated to being the back seat driver this trip. When we got back to the house we were welcomed to an 88 degree inside temperature. Our A/C had gone on the fritz. After calling our service company they said they were quite busy. Then the guy asked if we had a contract with them after finding that out he said that someone would be out that afternoon. Luckily for us it was fixed in rather short order.

And now we just have such beautiful and HOT weather with rain almost every afternoon. Out retention pond at the entrance to the development is almost over its bank and flowing into the adjacent small lake. It is the most water we have seen in that pond since moving here in 2005.
