### VOUNTEER HONORED FOR WORK WITH MUSEUM AT PROPHETSTOWN

Hugh Henry, 89, who was recognized in the Journal and Courier's Power of Caring section on Sunday for his efforts with the West Lafayette Tree Fund, has also been recognized by the Museum at Prophetstown for his years of volunteering.

On Sunday, the museum presented Henry with a framed photograph of him driving a team of Belgian horses.

Henry who grew up on a farm near Evansville during the era depicted at the farm at Prophetstown, said he does whatever "turns up" during the at least one day per week he's at the living history facility.



"I do everything," said Henry, who drives the horse-drawn trolley while conducting guided tours. "Plow, disk, plant corn."

Henry said his volunteer activities are just a way to get outside his home at Westminster Village.

"He's just an outdoor man, a farmer, all of his life," said Henry's wife, Marge, about a man who also had careers with the USDA and Purdue University.

In 2002, Henry was named "Outstanding Volunteer in the state of Indiana" by the Indiana Association of Housing and Services for the Aging. From news article June 28 2004.

Hiking the Appalachian Trail as a voyage of rediscovery

As a psychologist, Ted Glackman listens to other people's problems. As head of the Joseph J. Peters Institute, which deals with sexual-abuse issues, he wrestles with organizational problems.

To unwind, he plays basketball once a week. When his spirit needs a full recharge, he takes a hike.

In spring and fall, he and a couple of pals spend a long weekend hiking and camping, often on the Appalachian Trail, the storied 2,160-mile highway for hikers that runs from Georgia to Maine. It's a ritual he began with his son, Jake, about 13 years ago.

We who live in or around Philadelphia are blessed; the trail arcs around us like the three-point line on a basketball court. We can access the trail at

numerous points from west of Harrisburg to north of Easton in a couple of hours.

Glackman, 50, of Ardmore, has walked all but 18 of Pennsylvania's 230 Appalachian Trail miles. Some sections he has hiked several times. He knows the most spectacular vistas.

The other day, I joined Glackman; his son Jake, 25, a cook; and hiking chum Tom Talone, 57, of Roxborough, as they set out on a three-day hiking/camping trip over an 18-mile section of the trail from Caledonia State Park south to Pen Mar, Pa. We met the trail where it crosses Route 30, about a half-hour west of Gettysburg (by car).

It began to ascend immediately. Jake Glackman, lean and rangy, with fresh shock absorbers, scampered over the roots and rocks like a jackrabbit. The old men, plodding gamely, breathing heavily, followed in Darwinian sequence. Talone, a vector-control worker for the city Health Department who is built more like a bear than a deer, was soon lathered. But the climb merely stoked the twinkle in his eyes.

"When I go backpacking, I'm in the moment," he said. "I don't think about the rest of my life - just what's ahead of me."

The reserved Ted Glackman has noticed that hiking can bring out "the other" in a man. The talkative become contemplative; the contemplative become talkative. For certain men, it's the ideal recreation. Moving over rough land fosters bonding, or the illusion of such. In the woods, men can freely indulge their natural silence.

Hiking stretches distances, slows time, reacquaints the soles, and the soul, with the feel of the planet.

"You can spend your entire day walking on concrete and other artificial material without your feet ever touching the earth," Glackman said. "It's important to go off the path and walk on nature's real estate."

As we neared the ridge of South Mountain, the terrain became nastier, a geologic crime scene rife with evidence of ancient turmoil, both glacial and volcanic. Huge boulders were stacked in wobbly piles, like cairns constructed by a tipsy giant. Here God had spilled his lithic Legos and forgotten to pick them up. It was like hopscotching across a jetty. Felsenmeer is the scientific term - "sea of rocks." Ted Glackman, enthralled, stopped to admire a rock adorned by a vein of pure white quartz. "Look at this!" he exclaimed. His reserve overcome, he sounded like a little boy who had stumbled on a piece of glowing Kryptonite.
