Her recipe for Cranberry Relish (sent in last fall's Swope Newsletter) is a "must have" for both Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners. Her recipe includes ways to serve it plain, or in jello - both are equally good!

When I was little, she owned a red ball that had a pattern in it that looked like this relish. (Picture of Amy Tice and Grandmas ball). My brother, cousins, and I all enjoyed playing a game called "School" with her using this ball on her front steps. Recently, I started thinking about other holiday items she



made, and came up with the following recipes. The Forget Cookies were my favorite, and I

remember how excited I was one year when she presented me with my very own bag of these cookies! Enjoy, and may you all have a blessed year in 2013!

### Forget Cookies

2 egg whites

3/4 cup white sugar

Dash of salt

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup chocolate chips

1 cup chopped pecans (or just double the chips if you don't like nuts)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cover a cookie sheet with foil. Beat egg whites until foamy and stiff.

Add salt, then gradually add sugar while continuing to beat. Fold in vanilla, chocolate chips, and pecans. Use a teaspoon to drop onto the pan. Place the pan in the oven, and turn OFF the oven. Do not open the oven for 8 hours! (A good idea is to make them in the evening and forget them overnight!)

### Orange Balls

12 oz. vanilla wafers, crushed

1 box powdered sugar

1 1/2 cup chopped nuts

1 6 oz. frozen orange juice, thawed

1 stick butter or margarine, melted

1 7 oz. bag flaked coconut (OPTIONAL)

Mix all together. Form into small balls. Roll balls in coconut if desired. Let stand 1 hour. Store in an airtight container.

By the time I was in high school and until shortly before his death he played with Art Ingles. I actually got to perform with them once at a Christmas program for area children.
