EXHIBIT TO OPEN AS MEMORIAL TO KEN McCUTCHAN

An exhibit of paintings from the collection of Ken McCutchan will hang in the McCutchan Gallery in the Forum Hall of the Wright Administration Building at the University of Southern Indiana.

An opening reception will be held at 2 p.m. on Sunday, October 27, hosted by USI President H. Ray Hoops. The exhibit is a tribute to Ken McCutchan's life of service to the community and to the University. The University community is invited to attend the reception.

Mr. McCutchan, one of the area's leading historians who wrote more than a half-dozen local history books, died in August. He painted for pleasure and collected the works of Indiana artists. His collection was one of the largest private collections of Hoosier art in Southern Indiana. During his lifetime he gave a large portion of his collection to the University of Southern Indiana for display and use as a teaching collection. The exhibit features paintings, prints, and ceramic works by various Hoosier artists, including William Merritt Chase, William Alden Mote, Michael Helton, Florita Eichel, Ron Riordan, Stephanie Sowards, Michael Evistrom, and George Smith.

At his death his collection of Indiana authors went to Historic New Harmony and his papers to the University Archives. He also left a major gift to

construct a teaching gallery for the art program at USI.

During the reception Bettie Engelbrecht of WIKY will reminisce about McCutchan's contributions to the early years of radio. Katie Waters, chair of the USI Department of Art, Music, and Theater, will talk about the value of the McCutchan collection for USI and the students. James Peva of Indianapolis will represent the family. Jim Sanders, USI director emeritus for corporate and foundation relations, will recall McCutchan's lifetime penchant for travel and history.

The reception is open to the public.

JUDY & NEIL McCUTCHAN'S ADVENTURE IN YELLOWSTONE

We had visited Yellowstone NP several times across the years. In 1998 we went on a trip to the NW of the USA. On our way back we went through Yellowstone. As all tourist do we bought a few souvenirs. The clerk seemed to be having a good time and we struck up a conversation. She said that she was retired and had gotten a job for Hamilton Stores in the park and it was fun. We thought about it and then in the winter of 2002 I searched the internet for the companys website.

After finding it Judy & I completed an application and mailed it off the middle of March. A week and a half later we had a telephone interview and were assigned to work at the Tower Store in the NE of the park.

We were advised that wed be living in the dormitory and eating in the employee dining room. Judy was to be cashier and I would work in the fountain. This is the dorm.



There were about 50 workers living two to a room. The van was used to shuttle workers to and from the store. The store was at the bottom of a hill (a walk of about 1/2 mile downhill seemed like 2

miles returning back up hill).

After about a week at the store I was asked if I would be Dorm Supervisor (janitor). It meant that Judy & I could stay on the same eating schedule,



so I ended up at the dorm and Judy at the store. Workers did a split shift with an early shift (8-12

and 3-6) and a late shift (12-4 and 6-9). I worked a straight 8 hour day. All of us had two consecutive days off, ours was Wed. & Thurs.

We had a bear family (female and two cubs) that lived around the store and dorm. And there was a deer family (female and male and female yearlings).



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There was a family of mountain sheep that could be seen once in a while also. Of course wed see a multitude of small animals in the area. As we traveled the park on our days off wed see elk, prong horns, moose

and bison (we didnt brake for bison as they were common). The moose were rather uncommon to see. Judy & I saw five bull moose in early September near an area called Petrified Tree.



Although there were wolf in the park they were rather allusive. On our weekends we visited various sites in



the park, West Yellowstone, MT, Cody, WY, Bozeman, MT, Billings, MT, Idaho Falls, ID, Jackson, WY, Cooke City, MT, Gardiner, MT, Red Lodge, MT. We traveled and saw the Tetons, Craters of the Moon (in Idaho), the Chief Joseph Scenic Highway and went over the Beartooth mountains through the pass (10,200). We were also able to visit my niece Mary Helen and her husband Jack in Missoula, MT. And were able to visit my sister Marg in a nursing home there.
